Mayor's awards honour community heroes

The Mayor's 2021 Award for Service to the Community rewarded people nominated by residents in the borough for going out of their way to improve the lives of others and included a new Community Heroes award for those who supported residents affected by Covid. Two local residents, Lisa Ryan and Sasja McCann were awarded for setting up a Covid helpline in Albury, distributing information leaflets and co-ordinating a team of volunteers to help with food parcels, prescriptions and community transport.



Lisa and Sasja said: "We're honoured to receive this award on behalf of all of our volunteers. The start of the Covid pandemic was a scary time for everybody, and things were so uncertain. We wanted to create this network to let vulnerable people, who were in their homes and scared to go out for essential items, know that help was available. In the end we had more volunteers than people who needed our help. The thought that everybody wanted to do something was very humbling, and it's helped us to get to know our community and meet new people." Mandira's Kitchen also won a

Community Heroes Award for providing 250 meals to vulnerable families over the Christmas holidays.

Out and About

We have made a big effort to clear neglected ditches. The work at Farley Green was carried out to an excellent standard and we took the opportunity to sort out the overgrown and silted pond. We removed over 100 barrow

loads of silt and weeds and a new pipe was installed and connected to the pipe which crosses the road, replacing the collapsed one. This cured the puddle on the Green.

Going forward, we will look at the hippo ponds in the woods near to Lipson cottages but we need to establish responsibility first.



The ditch on the bridleway at the top of Church Lane has been cleared, and is now working well in heavy rain. Grass cutting is now happening: at Farley Green, the Recreation Ground, the Community Meadow, Albury Heath, Little London and the posts on the A248 by the Albury Estate office will be strimmed. The plants for the troughs in Albury village have also been planted.

SCC have completed remedial work at St Martha's car park and the surrounding footpaths, hopefully curing the problem of flooding onto the road. Unfortunately, the ditch in the car park is full and overgrown and needs clearing but currently SCC have no funds for this, so sadly this will have to wait.

Natural England announces proposed expansion of Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty



Natural England has announced that the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) is to be considered for boundary expansion. Securing this designation would allow the area to benefit from greater protections, so that more of England's beautiful landscapes are safeguarded for future generations.

The Surrey Hills AONB stretches across a quarter of the county of Surrey and includes the chalk slopes of the North Downs from Farnham in the west to Oxted in the east, and south to the deeply wooded Greensand Hills which rise in Haslemere. To find out more go to www.surreyhills.org

B4SH for Farley Green

Broadband for Surrey Hills (B4SH) is a community based and community funded initiative to bring high speed, reliable broadband to the rural areas of the Surrey Hills. This initiative has been based on the pioneering Broadband for the Rural North (B4RN) that successfully brought broadband services to the rural communities of Lancashire, Yorkshire and Cumbria.



Work has been underway since 2018 and there are now live operating services in Shamley Green, Willingshurst, White Lane, Halfpenny Lane, and Albury village.



Supported by local residents there is an active push into Farley Green where services should be enabled for residents in late 2021rolling forward into spring 2022. This will be B4SH's largest concentrated deployment to date so you will no doubt see lots of activity across Farley Green as we bring this to reality and strange machinery as we dig the fibre in.

Of course, with all such schemes active volunteers are the key to making things happen and special thanks are due to John Brockwell, Duncan Godfrey, Calvert Han, Bob Dowson, Carolyn Low, Andi McCann alongside the B4SH team headed by Anthony Townsend.

The Green Project



With the current news of record temperatures along the West Coast of the USA and Canada and increased temperatures in recent summers here (but typically not while I write this), along with increased flooding in areas of the UK, not necessarily always due to climate, as well as national and government schemes, it is no surprise that more local initiatives that look at what can be done to help with climate change and the environment have commenced across the UK.

With the support of Albury Parish Council, two local residents, a few councillors, alongside our Guildford Borough Councillor, Diana Jones, have formed a group to propel local climate change and environmental related activities. Modelled on the approach in Effingham we are seeking interested local residents to come forward with their own ideas that they wish to progress.

The group's role is to help mobilise these ideas, connect to others in the Albury community or in other local parishes undertaking similar initiatives, and to join individuals or

teams who have similar interests, and help to source funding, where possible, with the objectives of:

- Making a sustainable difference to local climate impacts
- Making it easier for ideas to get started

Effingham Climate Change group have been working since June 2020 and have several initiatives and projects underway including recycling, tree planting, looking into electric car charging points and flooding.

They are also able to offer advice on a diverse range of subjects, all of which are geared towards achieving something to help with climate change.

Each local area has their own different conditions and environmental issues and with it, opportunities to achieve something locally that will add to an overall improvement.
